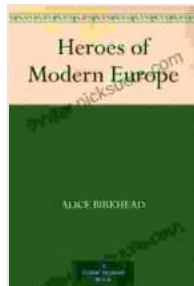

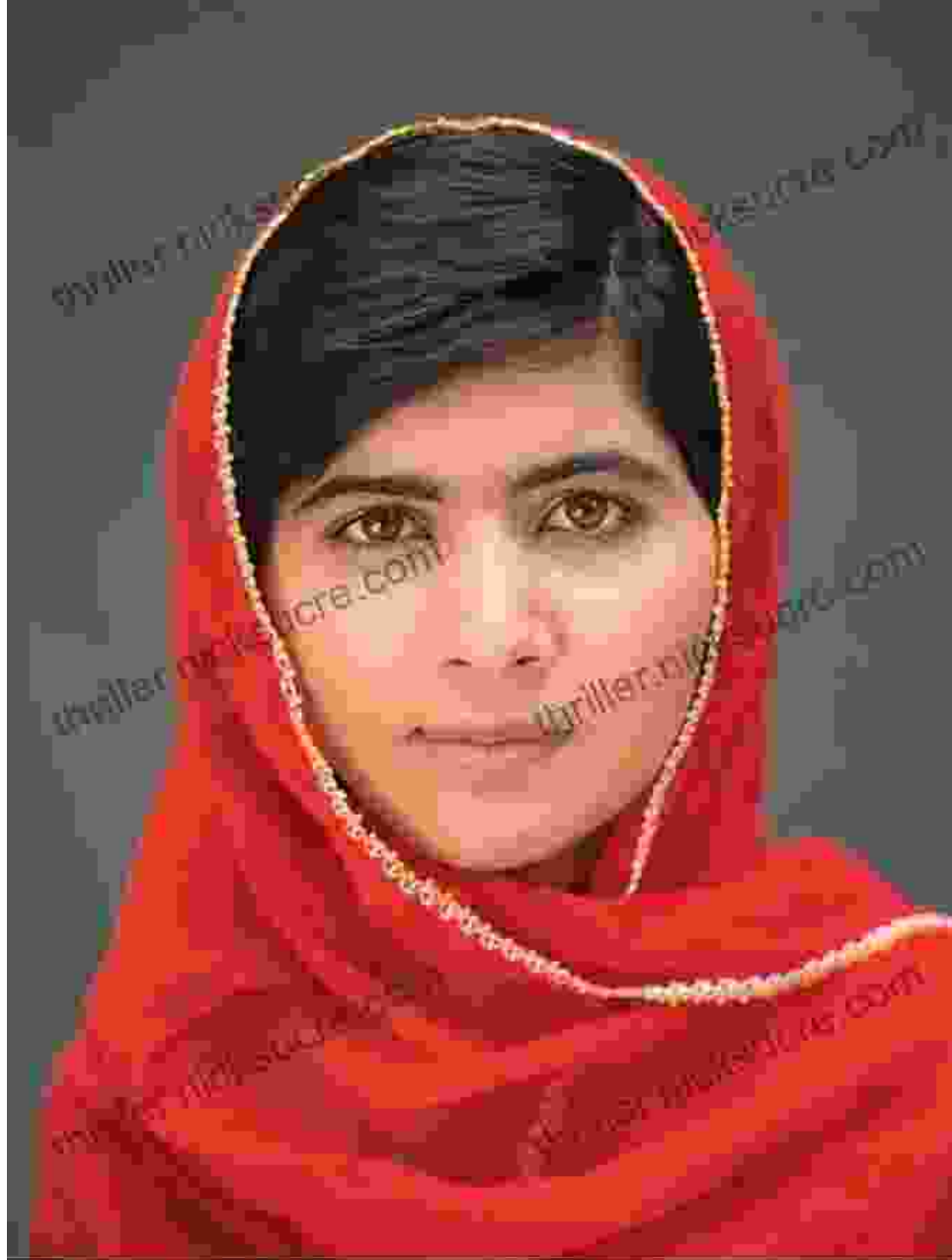
2. Václav Havel: The Czech Playwright Who Became President

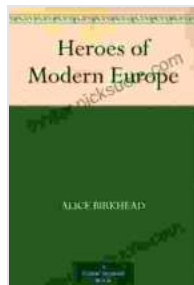
3. Malala Yousafzai: The Pakistani Schoolgirl Who Stood Up for Education

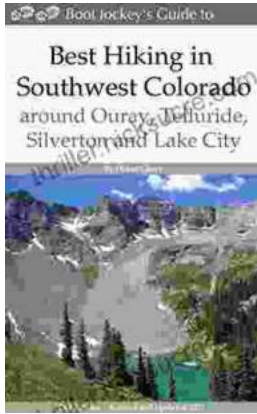

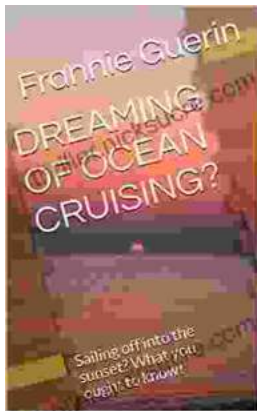
