

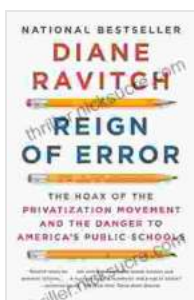

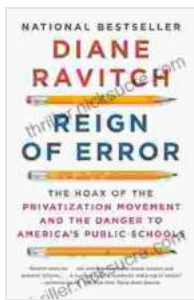
Free and Equal Education: A Fundamental Right
